Open Content and Licenses


Creative Commons licenses allow you to share a your copyright protected works and give other people certain freedoms. Choose a license using the disk to see what it means in practice.

Open access to scholarly articles, research data, and educational materials produced at universities is a global trend. Finnish universities have signed the Berlin Declaration on Open Access. Many universities and research funders require that scholarly articles are published openly and recommend or demand that research data should be available as openly as possible.
